BAILEY AND SULLIVAN LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE / ANNUAL SEMINAR

The Bailey and Sullivan Leadership Institute (BSLI) is named in honor of Deirdre Lynne Bailey (1970-2003) and Lisa Yvette Sullivan (1961-2001). In the late 1980s, Lisa and Deirdre were part of a team of New Haven teenagers and young adults who registered Blacks to vote and organized young volunteers for political campaigns, resulting in the election of New Haven's first Black mayor, John Daniels. Deirdre was a high school student at the time and Lisa was a graduate student at Yale. Their political work and mentorship of young people spanned more than twenty years. In June 2000, Deirdre and Lisa brought their commitment to youth leadership and political change to BAEO's founding meetings. Alongside elected officials, educators and activists from across the country, Deirdre was a founding member of BAEO and was instrumental in launching the Philadelphia BAEO chapter. During founding meetings for BAEO, Lisa facilitated a discussion to define BAEO's approach to reaching and supporting emerging leaders, and she advised BAEO through its transition from Milwaukee to Washington, DC. Lisa and Deirdre's passing in October 2001 and July 2003, respectively, was deeply felt by the leadership and members of BAEO. Inspired by their example, BAEO relies on BSLI to identify, train and support dynamic leaders who direct the change to make parental choice a viable and sustained lever of power for parents from low-income and working-class communities.

The Fifth Annual Seminar on Education Policy & Parental Choice (hereafter the Annual Seminar) is sponsored by BSLI in partnership with the Harvard University Program on Education Policy and Governance. The Annual Seminar seeks to identify and organize a bipartisan pool of Black elected officials who support parental choice programs for low-income and working-class families. With this in mind, the goals of the 2009 Annual Seminar are to:

- Provide time for participants to network with other elected officials, policymakers and allies who strive to empower parents to choose the best educational options for their children;
- Create space for elected officials and policymakers to discuss parental choice efforts at the local, state and national level;
- Examine real-world experiences of Black "parental choice" officials who are effectively balancing their advocacy work on behalf of parental choice while maintaining their allegiance to their political party;
- Offer elected officials techniques and resources for expanding quality educational options back home; and,
- Disseminate information from academic studies about the impact of the parental choice movement on families and children and the overall education reform movement in general.
