# **Reflections from BAEO Leadership**

n March 14-16, we kept our promise to inform, inspire and empower over 600 BAEO members and supporters from 29 states – the highest level of participation in six years! As always, the program was filled with incredibly inspirational speakers and dynamic concurrent session facilitators and special feature presenters. Participants used such words as *overflowing with talent, uplifting, recharged, engaging, hopeful, empowering, enlightening and reflective* to describe BAEO Symposium 2013 and its deep impact on their lives.

The Symposium's theme of College Readiness: The New North Star was transformational! BAEO unequivocally believes all children deserve high-quality K-12 educational options that prepare them to be "college ready" and earn a college degree – a key factor in closing the success gap, eradicating poverty, and transforming communities. Over the course of the Symposium – during casual conversations before and after sessions and during meals - participants increasingly connected the importance of K-12 education preparing students to be college-ready with BAEO's two primary objectives: to ensure that all Black children have access to high-quality educational options and that their parents are empowered to access those options. Participants concluded that college readiness is an essential, compelling purpose for BAEO's continuing struggle on behalf of our children and their families.

The Symposium featured sessions on the Common Core State Standards as a platform to re-imagine teaching and learning so that all student graduates from high school are prepared for post-secondary education. Several participants toured the Ocoee Middle School, an Apple distinguished school for its innovative uses of technology to improve student engagement and outcomes. Many participants enrolled in Apple's 21st century teaching and learning environment for using current technology and apps to help students meet the Common Core State Standards.

Over 100 rising high school juniors and seniors participated in our first ever, two-day **College Readiness and Success Boot Camp**, which was led by coaches from Beyond 12, an organization which provides high school and college students nationwide with personalized

coaching and technology for succeeding in college. Another Symposium-first was the **Elected Official Awards Ceremony** which recognized 16 elected officials from across the nation who actively supported policies and programs that give Black parents more high-quality choices for their children's education.

Symposium 2013 also provided an opportunity for BAEO to increase its social media impact, which allows our message to reach even more concerned citizens. During the first two days of the Symposium, BAEO had more Twitter mentions than we have had in six months and added 197 new members!



Principal Sharyn Gabriel conducted a tour of Ocoee Middle School, an Apple Distinguished School, for Symposium participants. The diverse student population of 1500 students use iPod Touches, iPads, iMacs, MacBooks, Skype, and many other tools for immediate feedback on learning, to find information quickly, and engage in project learning.

# **Documentary Film Screening**

# **American Promise**

Filmmakers and parents, Michele Stephenson and Joe Brewster, turned the cameras on themselves as their son began school at a renowned independent college prep school. Symposium participants watched the family grapple with the meaning of a "good education," the harsh realities facing young Black boys in today's schools, and a steadfast desire to put their son on a successful path. *American Promise* has become a comprehensive, cross-platform campaign aimed at engaging parents, youth, educators and community leaders in efforts to close the achievement gap in education.



# **College Readiness and Success Boot Camp**

he first ever two-day College Readiness and Success Boot Camp kicked off with a documentary film screening of *First Generation*, which features Golden Globe nominee Blair Underwood narrating the story of four high school students who set out to break the cycle of poverty and bring hope to their families and communities by pursuing a college education. Over 100 rising high school juniors and seniors, many themselves first generation college applicants, viewed the documentary as a foundation for the a day-long Boot Camp for college readiness and success.

Two experienced college coaches from Beyond 12, an organization that provides high school and college students nationwide with personalized coaching and technology for succeeding in college, joined Bishop Cheryl McBride Brown and BAEO's Ethan Ashley, to facilitate sessions with the students that explored career hopes, college entrance requirements and personal strengths in developing a plan for college readiness and success.





# Dr. Marvin L. Sapp

"Many of our children are repeating the lives of their parents and grandparents. Our challenge as adults is to remind our children they do not need to relive their family history. Their challenge is to go after their destiny.

... Our responsibility is to stretch ourselves to do things we have never done before for our children to get results we never thought we could. We need to engage in the processes of transformation of our thinking, relocation out of our comfort zone, isolation from people who hold us back, communication and separation."





# **Funders Panel**

A panel of BAEO funders expressed enthusiasm for the growing national discussion and legislative support for parental choice and the increased community involvement in conversations about what school reform should look like. Their major area of concern was closing schools before districts are ready to open new schools they know will work.

The funders especially value grant applications from organizations that have passion and capacity for involving parents as active partners, building a broad base of political and parental support, and fulfilling their promises for delivering common work uncommonly well.

They praised BAEO for speaking truthfully, focusing tightly on its Mission, and working especially well with legislative, philanthropic and other education reform stakeholders. Their recommendations for funding BAEO's future included engaging with more rich Black people who are eager to give back as well as continuing to trust itself and giving witness to its important work.
