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BAEO HISTORY

MARCH 1999

First Symposium

The Institute for the Transformation of Learning (ITL) at Marquette University in Milwaukee, WI, hosted more than 150 participants to discuss the theme, "The Power of Options."

DECEMBER 1999

Founders Meeting

Fifty-two Black supporters of educational options met at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, DC to establish BAEO as a national organization. Our founders are listed on page 10.

MARCH 2000

National Organizing Meeting

Approximately ninety people met after the second Symposium to review the first draft of the by-laws and elected Howard Fuller the first president (the title was later changed to Chair of the Board) and authorized him to organize a national board representing a variety of influencers from government and private sector organizations.

AUGUST 2000

The Launch of BAEO

BAEO was launched at the National Press Club in Washington, DC. A webcast is available at www.connective.com.

JANUARY 2001

First Chapter

Milwaukee was authorized as BAEO's first chapter.

SEPTEMBER 2001

First National Media Campaign

The All Kids Need Choice media campaign was conducted in Washington, DC, to spotlight our mission.

MAY 2002

Victory for Vouchers

BAEO celebrated the Supreme Court decision that vouchers are a constitutional means by which students can be educated in Ohio.

MARCH 2003

First Local Public Information Campaign

Chapters from Dallas, Detroit, Milwaukee and Philadelphia launched a public information campaign funded by the US Department of Education -Project Clarion - to promote Supplemental Educational Services (SES) and Public School Choice. The slogan for the project was "Parents You have a Right to Know." More than 5,000 parents received information about SES.

BAEO HISTORY (CONT.)

SEPTEMBER 2003

First Statewide Media Campaign

The Step Up for Students media campaign was launched in Florida to inform parents and the community about the Corporate Income Tax Credit program. The Program helped more than 17,000 children.

NOVEMBER 2004

Bailey and Sullivan Leadership Institute

Bailey and Sullivan Leadership Institute held the first Seminar on Education Policy and Parental Choice at Harvard University in partnership with the Kennedy School of Government's Program in Education Policy and Governance.

MARCH 2005

Fifth Anniversary

BAEO is the preeminent national organization for Black people who support parental choice to empower families and increase quality educational options for Black children.

Quality Principles

The board adopted a set of principles to guide the design, implementation and evaluation of quality educational programs.

JANUARY 2006

First Ohio Information Campaign

The Ohio mobilization team in partnership with local and national allies informed more than 90,000 eligible families and students about of the EdChoice Scholarship Program.

OCTOBER 2007

After School Study

"More than homework, a snack, and basketball: Afterschool Programs (ASPs) as an Oasis of Hope for Black Parents in Four Cities," was published to empower low-income and working class Black parents with information about the benefits of ASPs and to influence policy decisions regarding the design and implementation of appropriate educational opportunities in ASPs for urban families. Former BAEO President Gerald Robinson was the principal investigator.

AUGUST 2008

LaBAEO Advocates for New Orleans Scholarship Program

The Louisiana mobilization team in collaboration with national and local allies supported the creation of the Student Scholarships for Educational Excellence Program. The first year, 641 students enrolled in 31 private schools.

DECEMBER 2008

BAEO/Gates Small High Schools Project

The Gates Small High Schools project supported three schoolstwo in Philadelphia and one in Milwaukee-in its network, serving approximately 600 students.

NOVEMBER 2009

Black Democrats Support Grows for Education Reform

Bailey and Sullivan Leadership Institute and Harvard University's Program on Education Policy and Governance held the fifth anniversary Seminar on Education Policy and Parental Choice (SEPPC) in Atlanta, GA for Black Elected Officials. In just five years, SEPPC has grown from 16 participants to more than 180.

MARCH 2010

A Decade of Progress

BAEO celebrates its 10th Annivesary at the Hilton Milwaukee City Center in Milwaukee, WI on March 4-6 and recommitted to continue the Struggle to project, expand and enact new parental choice policies and programs. The High Quality Blackled Charter Schools Strand was launched, and the Symposium continued to inform, inspire and empower.

NOVEMBER 2010


Influence. Advocate. Lead.

When Hurricane Katrina shredded the levees in New Orleans, the floodwaters took lives, homes and a piece of the soul of the city. But when the water receded, it exposed the problems of the past, most vividly, the disastrous school system that robbed the futures from generations of people. And they decided not to rebuild that system, letting it sink into the soil with the storm water. Director/producer Ben Lemoine films five children, ages 9 to 11, through the 2009-2010 school year and interviews national leaders in education, as well as state and city officials. Lemoine takes an inside look at the current state of education and the social issues that surround it in New Orleans, and explores both the political and the personal implications of these changes. "THE EXPERIMENT" examines the debate through the eyes of those it affects most, and poses the question that no one seems to be asking - If you could create a school system from scratch, what would you change?




